FROM PROTEST TO POLICY FORMATION

In 2007 Mississippi *fully* funded the MS Adequate Education Program funding formula for the first time since its passage in 1997 because grassroots community groups had identified their common ground and learned to pool their strengths and resources across the traditional barriers of race, class, geography, political party affiliation and status.

In December 2006 for the first time in Mississippi history the Legislative Budget Committee held its budget deliberations in public session. When the Senate members refused to support the House members on full funding for the MS Adequate Education Program the Speaker of the House decided that the public needed to be able to observe the deliberations so they could understand who was trying to prevent the full funding of the state's education funding formula.

During a break in the deliberations of the Legislative Budget Committee, House members caucused on strategies to overcome the lock-step loyalty of Senate members to the Governor's steadfast opposition to full funding of the MAEP.



When Speaker of the House Billy McCoy let it be known late one afternoon during December 2006 that the Legislative Budget Committee deliberations would be open to the public for the first time, Southern Echo, the MS Delta Catalyst Roundtable partners, and Education Stakeholder Alliance members put out the word. When the deliberations began early the next morning every seat in the meeting chamber was filled.
